Due to the limited storage space on campus, Merritt College Administrators and staff are pursuing alternative means of storage. A demo on **M-Files** was provided which presented participants with an easier, more modern way to store and search for pressing files.

Vice President of Instruction, Deans, and Directors discussed and initiated a recruitment plan for Merritt College. A lead person, **David Morales**, was identified and will have the responsibility of documenting a strategic plan that will increase our recruitment results.

Dr. Blake and I attended the **East Bay Innovation Awards** at Fox Theatre in Oakland. This year, the East Bay Innovation Awards honored two well-deserving programs: Hack the Hood and The Bread Project.

Administrators, Faculty, and Staff attended Merritt College's First **Educational Master Plan** Town Hall to embark on an 8-week 2020 visioning plan. The town hall was well attended. The follow up meeting will be held on March 8, 2016.

Dr. Rosemary Delia and Dean Romeo Garcia met with representatives from **UCSF Benioff Children's Hospital** in Oakland to explore the opportunity of offering academic credit, internship and volunteer opportunities for our students.

I would like to thank Cy Bracy from our Medical Assistant Program who invited Dr. Darrick Smith to address our students and motivated each of them to believe in themselves as they achieve their goals and reach their full potential, all while raising the bar in education.

Merritt College's **AFR Steering Committee Team** continues to work diligently on the accreditation recommendations. This week, the AFR Steering Committee had a special guest, **Chancellor Laguerre**, who received an update on the progress of the team.

Over the years, Merritt College has partnered with **Skyline Lacrosse** and **Montclair Soccer Club** in renting our athletic field and stadium. This month both groups showed interest in continuing to use our facilities. Together we are seeking innovative ways we can maintain and renovate our fields.

Dr. Darrick Smith, who spoke to the Merritt community during FLEX Day in January, is returning to campus on as a guest speaker at a seminar on Early Intervention to Support Student Success. His talk,



“Raising the Bar in Education,” will center around three themes: Believe in yourself; Achieve your goals; and Reach your full potential. The seminar will be held on Tuesday, March 1, from 12:30 to 4 p.m. in the Student Lounge. The seminar is sponsored by Merritt's Allied Health Programs.

Music Appreciation Class Gets Creative Thanks to New Music Instructor



Any students who thought they could graze through Music Appreciation class just by showing up and listening has never had a teacher like Monica Ambalal. The first major project she assigned the class was to form groups and create an instrument from material found at home. Though students were a bit wary at first, they all ended up completing the project and proudly presenting their instruments to the class—an Indian flute made from PVC pipe, a drum made from a trash can and duct tape, maracas made from soda bottles, and many more that showed their resourcefulness and creativity.

"I think it's super important to have alternate teaching methods in the classroom," says Monica, who holds a Ph.D. in World Music and began a recent lesson on Bach by playing a beautiful prelude on the piano. "By doing this project, they were able to see that they have music right in their own homes and they don't even realize it. They are exposed to building materials in their kitchens, their garages, and their back yards. They learned that every time they made a hole in an instrument they were experiencing the timbre of that instrument which connected a connect a creativity aspect to the project."

The students also learned other life lessons beyond music. They used participatory skills by selecting a project coordinator, a historian, and a biographer; critical thinking skills by coming up with a plan; writing skills by completing an assessment; and public speaking skills by presenting to the group. "When I started this class, I knew zero about music," said Nayan Pandey, whose flute-making partner Stephanie Hernandez added, "We love this class!" **(Pictured: Students showing off their creative instruments.)**

Secretary of the Cuban Embassy to Speak on New U.S./Cuba Relations on March 9



Thanks to Dr. Siri's Brown's strong connections to Cuba stemming from more than 10 student and faculty visits, the first secretary of the newly reestablished Cuban Embassy in Washington D.C. will start an important conversation with the Merritt community and the public.

Miguel Fragas, will discuss "Has U.S. Policy Really Changed," on Wednesday, March 9 at noon in the

Student Lounge, and talk about issues including recent changes to travel restrictions, communications, and the new opportunity for business between the two countries. This will be a unique opportunity for students and the entire community to ask questions about the latest developments in the relations between Cuba and the United States.



Merritt College is one of only six locations Secretary Fragas will be visiting as he tours the Bay Area from March 7 to 11, engaging audiences about the current relations between the U.S. and Cuba. "Right now there's a lot of interest in learning more about Cuba, and I think there is a lot of misinformation that exists," said Fragas in an interview with the newspaper *El Tecolote*. "However, almost all opinion polls in the U.S. show that most Americans support the reconciliation between our two countries."
