**Dr. Fabian Banga to present
at UC Berkeley’s
Institute of European Studies**

Dr. Fabian Banga, chair of BCC’s Modern Languages Department, will lecture on *Brujos, Espiritistas y vanguardistas* at UC Berkeley’s Institute of European Studies, Noon-1 p.m., Thur., Apr. 28, in 201 Moses Hall on the UC Berkeley campus. The lecture covers his newly published book which explores representation of esoteric traditions in aesthetic projects of Latin American and Spanish avant-garde literary movements in the early 20th century. The new work expands on Dr. Banga’s doctoral dissertation, which was mentored by UC’s Dr. Francine Masiello, professor of Spanish and comparative literature and Sidney and Margaret Acker Distinguished Professor in the Humanities, at UC Berkeley. The presentation is free and open to the public.

“Media: Propaganda and Censorship—Who Decides What is News,” a lecture by Professor Mickey Huff of Diablo Valley College, takes place at 12:15 p.m., Wed., May 4 in BCC’s Auditorium at 2050 Center St. The event is free and open to the public. In 2010, Dr. Huff became the director of the renowned Project Censored: The News that Didn’t Make the News. Project Censored’s work—including its annual book, weekly radio broadcasts, campus affiliates program, and additional community events—highlights the important links among a free press, media literacy and democratic self-government. Founded in 1976 at Sonoma State University by Dr. Carl Jensen, project members annually research, vet, and compile the top 25 most censored and under-reported news stories in the U.S., and offer scholarly analysis and critiques, which are published by Seven Stories Press.

Dr. Tori Hoehler of NASA's Ames Research Center presents, "Innumerable Globes Like This One? The Science Of Searching For Life Beyond Our Solar System," 7-8 p.m., Thur., Apr. 28 in BCC's auditorium. Sponsored by a California Institute for Regenerative Medicine (CIRM) grant, the lecture is free and open to the public. Widely published in his field, Dr. Hoehler has served as a Mars Science Laboratory collaborating research scientist and on the Europa lander science definition team. Dr. Hoehler is a research scientist, with NASA Ames Research Center's exobiology branch. He holds a doctorate in marine chemistry and in biogeochemistry from the University of North Carolina.
